The findings are well articulated and presented with clarity and logic addressing the evaluation questions and criteria, but could perhaps better aggregate the results of the CP portfolio (of about 17 projects). The Conclusions are well formulated but too summarized. There seems to be a gap between the level of granularity in the findings and the conclusions, particularly regarding the insights related to results obtained by the CP in the thematic areas of intervention. More recommendations are needed to address other issues identified, specially those related to programming.
